- NPIE 8 Save the date: The next New Perspectives on Irish English conference (NPIE 8) takes place at the Universidad de Extremadura in Cáceres from May 16–18, 2024. - EFACIS 2023 in Belfast Call for papers: The next conference of the European Federation of Associations and Centres of Irish Studies (EFACIS) takes place in Belfast from 24.8-27.8.2023. The call for papers has been published at https://www.efacis.eu/event/2023-efacis-conference-belfast-unions-and-partitions-ire-land. The conference topic is 'Unions and Partitions in Ireland'. The deadline for proposals of conference panels/roundtables (3 speakers) or individual papers is 27.2.2023. We are hoping for a large linguistic presence at this, the first conference since the Irish English Network became an affiliated EFACIS organisation with representation on the EFACIS board. - New opening in the EFACIS Literature as translation project: The European Federation of Associations and Centres of Irish Studies (EFACIS), is currently looking for proposals for the upcoming installment of its long-running literature as translation project. The new installment builds on the past successes of Yeats Reborn (2015), Translating Banville (2018), the Aistriu project with N.U.I Galway (2020) and Anne Enright (cf., e.g. https://enright.efacis.eu/). The project allows both scholars and their students to translate texts of the chosen author. The selected translations and their commentaries will be published on this website.  The EFACIS book club aims to introduce readers to highlights of Irish literature, both past and present. All meetings of the EFACIS book club take place online, via zoom. Readings and discussions are in English and take place on Wednesdays between 8 pm and 10 pm (CET). During our 2-hour sessions, the work is briefly introduced and contextualized by an expert and then discussed by the participants of the session. Sometimes authors join the book club meetings in the second half. The book club is open to all. - Centre of Irish Studies at the University of Extremadura in Cáceres: Congratulations to our Irish English colleagues in Cáceres. The group, headed by Nancy Ávila, have created the Centre of Irish Studies at the University of Extremadura in Cáceres (https://www.efacis.eu/centre/university-extremadura). The centre, a recognised hub of the European Federation of Associations and Centres of Irish Studies (EFACIS), aims to promote interdisciplinary research on the language, literature, history and culture of the island of Ireland and the Irish diaspora. The centre brings together scholars specializing in Irish linguistic, literary, and cultural subjects such as Irish English (socio)linguistics and pragmatics, perceptual dialectology, fiction and the portrayal of Irish English voice and identity, gender studies and gender representation in fiction, Irish English historical linguistics, and emigrant letters, among other areas. In addition to interdisciplinary research, the centre aims at bringing Irish culture closer to the city of Cáceres. In doing so, it will organise conferences, workshops and other academic and non-academic activities in order to spread Irish culture. It is open to collaborations with other researchers, artists, and associations interested in Irish studies in Europe, (Latin) America, and beyond. IrEN and scholars of Irish English across the world look forward to future collaboration with the centre.
